D.C.'S CRIMINALIZATION OF SEX WORK ISN'T WORKING

The District, like most jurisdictions, has long had criminal penalties for consensual sexual exchange. Although widely used, such an approach has never worked – instead it only serves to harm the most vulnerable while fostering violence and exploitation.

IT'S TIME FOR A NEW APPROACH

Removing criminal penalties for engaging in sexual exchange reduces public violence and protects sex workers. People in the sex trade are safest when their work is not criminalized because they are able to screen clients, to negotiate safer sex practices, and to report incidents of trafficking or client and police violence.



Eliminates criminal prohibition & penalties for adult consensual sex work.



Retains protections for minors and prohibitions against coercion, exploitation, and human trafficking.



Establishes task force to evaluate decriminalization's impact & recommend improvements.
